Prairie Sentinel Hackberry – Celtis 'JFS-KSU1'



Description:

This fastigiate hackberry fills the need for a columnar tree for narrow city streets in the toughest climates. Discovered in the rugged high plains of western Kansas, it has great adaptability to heat, drought, and cold of the prairie and harsh urban sites. Height of 45 feet and 12 feet wide.



Description:

This is the narrowest of the Linden cultivars. Small, thick, deep green leaves give it a finer textured, more delicate appearance. Grows to a height of 45 feet and a spread of 15 feet.

Triumph Elm – *Ulmus* 'Morton Glossy'



Description:


Remarkably dark green and glossy foliage and a sturdy, symmetrical growth habit distinguish this Morton Arboretum introduction. Height of 55 feet and spread of 45 feet.



Description:

Arching limbs and a graceful vase shape characterize this outstanding hybrid elm selected and tested at Morton Arboretum. Glossy dark green foliage changes to yellow in the fall and is resistant to elm leaf beetle feeding. Growth habit gives good forrm in the nursery and an ultimate form like the American Elm. Height of 70 feet and 60 feet wide.

Northern Acclaim Honeylocust – Gleditsia triacanthos 'Harve'



Description:

Selected by Dale Herman at North Dakota State University for its cold hardiness in the rugged environment of the Great Plains. Northern Acclaim® develops a more upright shape than most, similar to Skyline®. Height of 45 feet and 35 feet wide.

Boulevard Linden – Tilia americana 'Boulevard'



Description:

Tall and narrow, this selection of the native American Basswood is very hardy and well suited to street plantings. Height of 49 feet and 25 feet wide.

Ivory Silk Lilac Tree – Syringa reticulata 'Ivory Silk'

The Ivory Silk Lilac Tree is our other medium to small sized tree growing to be about 20-25' tall and 15-20' wide. This tree blooms later than most in early summer. It develops beautiful fragrant flowers that are cream colored and lacey in texture. Like the lilac shrub the flowers develop into small persistent seeds. Grows well in a variety of soil types and has been shown to be disease resistant.





Spring Snow Crab – *Malus* 'Spring Snow'

The Spring Snow Crab is a longtime running favorite. It is a medium to small sized tree that grows to about 20-25' tall and 15' wide. It is prized for its flowers and fruitless nature. It blooms in late spring and its leaves have a yellow fall color It is a hardy tree but due to the fact that it is from the Malus family it is susceptible to carious disease including apple scab and powdery mildew in cool moist seasons.





Bur Oak - Quercus Macrocarpa

Tolerant of a variety of moisture and soil conditions, adapts well to urban settings. Its fringed acorns are food for wildlife. A very long-lived tree. Prefers full sun. Grows 70' to 80', 80' spread. (zones 3-8)





Amur Chokecherry – *Prunus maackii*



This is a flowering and fruiting tree for colder regions. It makes a great choice for a specimen in a bird-friendly landscape. Birds nest in the well-balanced branches of this round-headed tree. It delivers a symmetrical look. Delightful, light green foliage covers the tree for summer, and in many years develops shades of yellow for fall color. The leaves typically drop quickly for easy fall clean-up. Mature height of 20-30' with a spread up to 25-30'.



Silver Queen Maple - Acer saccharinum

'Silver Queen' is typically fast-growing, somewhat graceful tree to the height of 40-50' with a spread of 40-50'. This is one of the largest deciduous trees know for its silvery undersides of its leaves. Grows tall with a rounded open spreading crown. Fall color is usually unremarkable and distinguished from the species by having better yellow fall color.
